I will be leading a field trip on Feb. 28, March 2nd & 3rd to the Gold Rock Ranch area. Come for a day or come and stay as long as you would like to. We will be collecting Dumortierite, Petrified Palm Wood, Kyanite and much more.

We will be camping at or near the ranch. The ranch is located 12 miles west of Yuma on 1-8, then north on S-34 (Ogilby Road) just 9 miles, then left on Gold Rock Ranch road for 1 & 1/2 miles and you are there.

The new rates at the Ranch are for any available site (with or without utilities) at \$20.00 per night. We honor Passport America, Enjoy America, Happy Camper and Coast to Coast Good Neighbor for half the daily rate. At this time we are in overflow and have only electric sites available with 15 amp service.

The chuckwagon will be open the days you are here. They serve breakfast and lunch from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Arizona time. On March 1 we are having a 1950's day with a rock-n-roll dance at 7 p.m. by Jim Thompson with lots of contests (\$5.00 per person) and a dinner at 5 p.m. that night (lasagna) for \$5. per person. No rental units are available at that time.

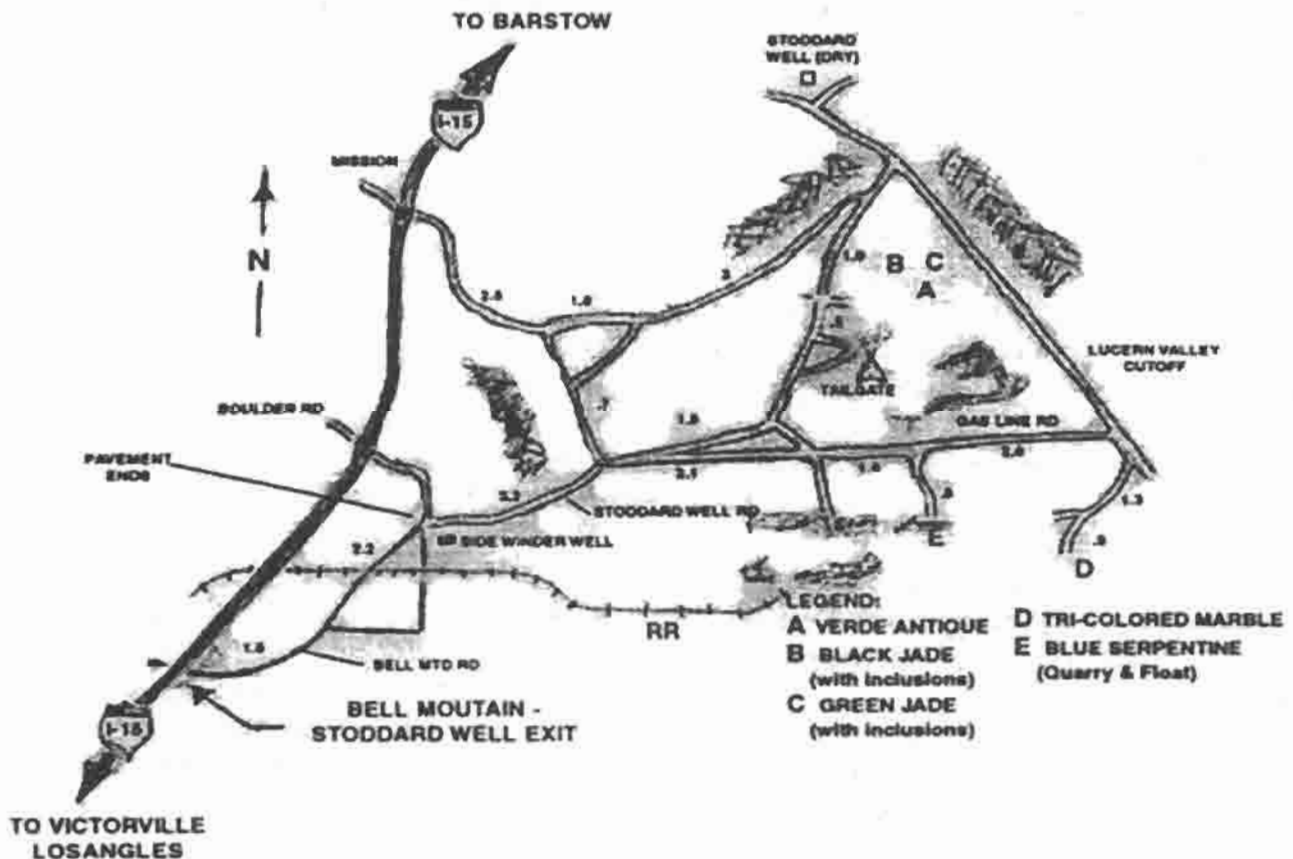
Our March field trip is to the 27th Annual Tailgate at Stoddard Well hosted by the Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club. Collect Verde Antique - Tri-Colored Marble - Jade, and buy just about anything.

What is a tailgate? It all began about 26 years ago when the Victor Valley Gem and Mineral Club began hosting a free field trip and sale at Stoddard Well collecting area. The Tailgate is open to all clubs and rockhounds. Everyone is allowed to sell or buy just about anything. Most items for sale are related to gems, minerals, findings, and other related things, but you never know what you will see. The area is also noted for its abundance of rocks for collecting.

Camping: This is a dry camp area, so bring in your own water and other necessities. Supplies are available at the Bell Mountain service road. Roads are desert dirt and can handle motor homes with no problem.

Gem and Mineral Collecting: Verde Antique, and Green & Black Jade collecting areas are within walking distance from the Tailgate. The Verde Antique is in float and in a quarry. Jade with magnetite inclusions can be found in seams. Digging tools are needed for the better materials. Field Trips may take collectors to the nearby Sidewander Mountains to find Tri-Colored Marble which ranges from greys to dark green. A four-wheel drive is advised for this trip.

Directions: Take I-15 past Victorville, past Stoddard Well road, and turn off (right) at Bell Mountain - Stoddard Well Exit. Follow above map to the tailgate and camp site. NOC signs will mark the camping area. Bring fire wood and food for a 6 p.m. potluck on Saturday.

Most of the people who usually work it will be gone. That weekend is beginning of Zzyzx, and is also the La Puente club show. Don is going to make a Rockhound cutout, J. Valley will take pictures of kids with it-digital so get almost instant computerized pix. Set up is Friday night. Nancy said can help set up and work some on Saturday.

The tallies on the stone selection was read and the stone chosen was an aquamarine. Izzie and others have donated some gold for Al to use for the mounting.

Protecting Privacy

You need to be aware of a potential personal privacy issue related to the popular search engine Google (<www.google.com>).

There is a new feature that makes it possible to type a telephone number into Google's search bar, click the search button, and have a MapQuest page returned as a result. Any person wishing to discover the physical location of a phone number, be it a home or business address, could use this feature to locate a physical street address, and receive explicit directions on how to get there from anywhere in the country.

One positive use of this feature could be to determine the location of, say, an adverse party for whom you may only have a telephone number. On a negative note, this feature could also be used by an angry party to find out where you live. Google has made available an option that will allow anyone to remove their telephone number from the database that is linked to the mapping feature.

You will first need to check if your number is listed in this manner by attempting a search - entering your full telephone number separated by dashes (e.g., 404-524-5811). If your number is on record, an icon resembling a telephone will appear next to the first or second entry on the results page (your name and address). Clicking on this icon will take you to a page containing a description of the service, and a link to request your number be removed from the database.

[Ed. Note: Can't believe how many references there are to our home phone number! Seems as if every AFMS and EFMLS newsletter, website and magazine which has our phone number shows up! We're not easily "findable" with a map because we use a post office box as our address and our phone is unlisted, but it's pretty mind-boggling to realize just how "public" we all are.]

Selecting Material for Cabochons

A beginner is often confused by the great variety of cabochon material offered for sale. Selection should be based on quality. Carefully inspect the material of your choice. It must be solid, free of any cracks or holes, and be uniform in texture. Certain kinds of jasper contain soft spots because all the pores did not fill up with the silica-bearing solutions. Check slabs of this kind by wetting the surface and watching to see if water remains on top or is soaked up. The material with soft spots will not polish.

Many slabs are displayed at dealers' tables in flat pans of water. Porous spots will soak up the water so it is best to allow the selected slab to dry thoroughly. To check it for uniformity in texture, hold it up to a strong light at an angle.

When the beginner chooses a material for his/her first attempt at gem cutting, agate, such as Montana, Mexican or Brazilian is a good choice. These agates are hard and tough enough to allow for mistakes that will be made and corrected. It is wise to make the first cabochon about one-half inch in size and gradually work on larger cabs as one gains experience.
