Emerald is Birth Stone for May

The name emerald derives from the Greek Smaragdos. It means “Green Stone” and in ancient times, referred not only to emeralds, but also probably to most green stones.

Emerald belongs to the beryl group being the most precious of the group. Its green is incomparable. The pigment is chrome, sometimes vanadium. The color is very stable against light and heat. Only the finest qualities are transparent.

Emeralds are found by rising magma and metamorphism. Deposits are therefore found mainly in or near pegmatite veins. Mining is nearly exclusively from host rock, where the emerald has grown into small veins or on walls of cavities. Alluvial mining would hardly be possible as the specific gravity is near that of quartz. The most important deposits are in Colombia, especially the Muzo Mine, which was first mined by the Incas. Mohs hardness is 7 ½-8 and refractive index is 1.576-1.582.

Lore and Legend has been attached to crystals. Emeralds were once thought to blind snakes. It probably means they couldn't see you.

Rare Red Diamond Returns to Natural History Museum

LOS ANGELES (CBS) - The “[Kazanjian Red](#),” a true blood-red diamond, is one of the rarest gems of all and only three large stones are known to exist.

The red diamond was purchased by Los Angeles-based Kazanjian Bros. Inc. in 2007 after many years of bouncing around in history.

Through the display and sale of the gem and the family's other private jewelry collections, the company's [Kazanjian Foundation](#) raises funds for scholarship programs for underprivileged youths.

The famed red diamond first appeared at the [Museum of Natural History](#) in Los Angeles in October of 2008 making it the gem's first exhibition in the U.S. It left four months later.

Now the diamond has returned for a second appearance in the Museum's Gem and Mineral Hall.

It will be on view from April 6 to May 29, 2009. The Museum is open seven days a week, 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is \$9 for adults, \$6.50 for students and seniors, and \$2 for children ages 5-12. For 24-hour Museum information please call (213) 763-DINO or visit www.nhm.org.

March Minutes: No corrections were noted to the March Minutes as published in the Club newsletter so the Minutes will stand as published.

2010 AFMS/CFMS/NOC SHOW: Mike Beaumont told us that we would be hosting a booth at the AFMS/CFMS Show in San Jose this next weekend advertising our 2010 Show. The theme is "Hidden Treasures." The Chiropractic School is going to provide us a quote for using their facilities on Thursday. He said that a 2010 Show Meeting had been held and a lot of ground covered.

Don Warthen told us that the only downsides of hosting the 2010 AFMS/CFMS Show was:

1. It will be very LABOR INTENSIVE. It was pointed out that the City of La Habra, The La Habra Youth Committee and many other individuals from many other clubs will volunteer to help out.
2. It is not yet known how much money we will need to "invest". He noted that only one AFMS show in recent memory had lost money, all others had come out ahead. Page 1
Article II

Section 1 OBJECTIVES AND PURPOSE

The objectives and purposes of the North Orange County Gem & Mineral Society is to disseminate knowledge of mineralogical and earth science and to encourage study in these subjects, through means of::

- * the presentation of public exhibitions, lectures, slide programs;
- * field trips for exploration, study and collection of specimens.;
- * The preparation, publication, and distribution of articles and studies pertaining to mineralogy and earth sciences;
- * the promotion of scientific research in these fields;
- * the encouragement of interest among young people and the fostering of classes in mineralogical and lapidary arts;

- * *The development and execution of plans for an earth science museum and lapidary arts workshop.*

- * And all other means which are appropriate to the accomplishments of the primary objectives set forth.

There are three suggestions for this change. The one the committees selected is listed below

ARTICLE 1 V INITIATION FEES AND DUES

Section 1

- A. Individual membership dues shall be ___ per year
- B. Family Member ship dues shall be ___ per year.
- C. Junior Membership Dues shall be ___ per year.

B. Family Membership shall be \$15.00 per year for the first person and \$10.00 per person per year for each additional family member. Initiation fee \$10.00 per person.

May Field Trip Owens Valley Collecting May 23-25, 2009

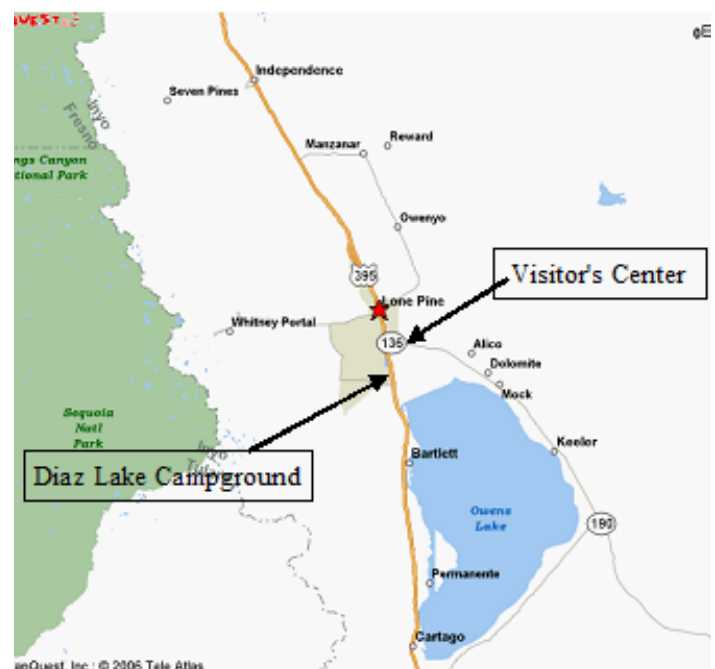

Doping Wax Problem

via LA Rocks

Hello Group

I am having problems with my black dop wax not sticking to the stone (it sticks nicely to the wooden dopsick.) Since I have had similar problems in the past with green and red dop wax, I am thinking there may be something I am doing wrong or else there is something about the nature of dop wax of which I am not aware. My wax was purchased two or three years ago at a rock show and I use a Diamond Pacific wax dop-pot to heat and melt the wax (presumably to the correct temperature - although I have the same problem when I heat it with a propane torch.) I keep the dop-pot covered when not in use to keep out any dust or debris.

Does dop wax get old and lose effectiveness?

Does it lose effectiveness by being melted too many times in the dop-pot?

Is there a trick (add a drop of vinegar, dance a jig, recite a poem) that I need to know???

HELP! I can't figure it out and I have lost a few good stones from flying off the dopstick while they were being sanded. Any advice will be much appreciated!

Ken's Advise

If you follow these steps, you should not have problems with your stone adhering to the dop wax:

1. First, the stone must be completely clean and oil free. Use soap and water or acetone or lacquer thinner to remove oil from the stone.

NOTE: Your cleaning method will depend on the type of cutting fluid, type of stone, and the stone's porosity.

2. After cleaning, water should not bead up on the stone, indicating the stone is completely oil-free.

3. Choose a dop stick that is as large as possible to use with your stone. The dop stick diameter should be at least 50 percent of the diameter of the stone. 75 percent is better.

NOTE: This gives more area for adhesion and also minimizes bending forces on the dop wax.

4. Next, the stone must be heated for wax to stick.

NOTE: Are you heating the stone before putting it on the hot wax? That is a critical step.

5. Put the stone on the flat surface of the wax heater, face down, with a small bit of wax on the back side of the stone.

6. When the small bit of wax starts to melt, the stone is hot enough to dop properly.

7. Now, dip the dop stick in the hot wax, gather a good sized glob of wax and press it onto the back of the stone.

8. Center the stick as accurately as possible on the back of the stone, and align it perpendicular to the rear of the stone.

NOTE: The stone is very hot now, so be careful.

9. As you lift the stone off the heating area, hold the stick straight up, and you will be able to manipulate the stone to get it centered and at a perfect right angle to the stick.

10. Wet your fingers and form the wax into a fillet around the base of the stone, giving more support.

11. Blow on the stone and wax to cool it off. The wax will harden rapidly.

12. After the wax is no longer soft, set the dopped stone aside and let it cool further.

13. When the stone has cooled to room temperature, apply medium pressure on it with your fingers, to verify adhesion. If the stone has been dopped properly, it will not come off the stick easily.

14. After the stone is completely finished, I have found the best way to remove the dop stick is to place the stone in the freezer for about 5 minutes.

NOTE: The stone and the wax have different rates of thermal expansion, and when the wax and stone are cooled, stress is placed on the wax which loosens it.

15. After 5 minutes in the freezer, the stone should pop off the end of the dop stick with finger pressure. I hope this helps you out.

Thanks

Thanks to all of you who responded to my dop wax question (and there were a LOT of you!) Numerous issues were identified and I think I may have been guilty of not doing any of them correctly! I was heating the stone - but just a little and definitely not enough. I cut with oil in my trim saw and was not doing a proper job of cleaning (now I am using acetone to really get it clean). There were some really excellent additional suggestions on how to determine if stone is hot enough (chip of dop wax on the stone will melt when the stone is hot enough, etc). this is a fantastic forum and I thank everyone for their time and kind advice.
